Welcome to the latest edition of Merri-bek Community News.

It's hard to believe that we are over half way through 2023 already, and so much work has already been achieved this year. Earlier in June we adopted our 4 Year Council Budget 2023-27, that will see \$217 million allocated to some of our critical services and projects.

Included in this is our largest ever capital works program, totalling \$123.2 million towards things like more public toilets, reconstruction of roads and footpaths, more kindergartens and exciting major projects like the Saxon Street Arts and Community Hub in Brunswick and the redevelopment of Fawkner Leisure Centre. We are also almost doubling our tree planting budget to ensure there is plenty of shade and tree canopy across Merri-bek in the future. You can learn more about our budget and our Capital Works Program inside this edition.



New mural brightens Fawkner Streets

We recently commissioned local artists Olana Janfa and Abbey Rich to create a community mural for Charles Mutton Reserve, Fawkner. Council invested \$20,000 in the project, from the play space upgrade budget which was \$150,000 for the 2022-23 financial year.

The artwork brings a range of bright colours - pinks and blues, yellows and oranges - to the local park. It also shows the joy to be found in our diverse community, sports and wildlife and celebrates community connections to underpin a bright, warm and empowering work of art.

The work was selected from a range of proposals for its creativity, sense of community and suitability for the space.

While working on the project, Abbey and Olana had plenty of local fans:

"The work was so lovely to create alongside the playground during school holidays, seeing the kids watch us paint and be excited to see themselves in the mural was really special."

Tips to keep warm and to reduce your energy bills

Set your heating to 18 – 20 degrees

When it's cold outside we may feel the need to turn our heater up high. But, setting it to 18-20 degrees will keep you comfortable and save you money. By lowering your thermostat by 1-degree cooler, you can decrease your heater bill by 15%.

Seal up draughts around windows and doors

Place door snakes at the bottom of doors and hang thick curtains on windows to keep the cold air out. You can buy draught-proofing strips from hardware stores to fill gaps around your doors.

Use your reverse cycle air-conditioner as a heater Oak Park electrician Andrew says, "A lot of people don't realise how efficient new split systems are. They actually heat as well as cool and they do them both very well."

Apply for a Merri-bek Energy Upgrade

If you own your home and are on a low income, we can help you upgrade your home. Council can pay up to \$2000 towards installing insulation and sealing up the gaps in your home to make it more comfortable. Maria from Pascoe Vale (pictured) had insulation installed through the program and felt the benefits straight away.

'It's the best thing I've done. It's comfortable, especially in summer,' she says.

Community ideas shape our latest budget

Late last year, we put the call out to the community for your ideas on projects, initiatives or programs to fund in our 2023/24 budget.

Climate Action Merri-bek member Andrea Bunting and Merri-bek Mayor, Cr Angelica Panopoulos

A total of \$250,000 was allocated to these ideas.

Merri-bek residents, community groups, sporting clubs, businesses and organisations were all welcome to contribute.

We received such a fantastic response, that Council increased the funding pool from \$20,000 to \$278,000 to include as many of the ideas as possible.

Some of the community ideas included more shade sails at parks, programs to support victims of domestic violence, bird nesting boxes and many more.

The community then voted on their favourite idea, and the top 3 projects were funded. We also decided to include an additional 3 because of the great suggestions we received as part of this process.

The successful community budget ideas for 2023/24:



\$80,000 for more shade structures in playgrounds and parks



\$33,000 will go to Take the First Step domestic violence prevention program



\$10,000 to install bird nesting boxes across Merri-bek



\$100,000 will increase accessible tennis facilities and reserves



Tania McKenna, Partnerships and Community Development Manager at Northern Community Legal Centre, and founder of 'Take the First Step' says,



Being able to get the message out that family violence help is available is a project close to my heart. This funding will support isolated newly arrived women to connect and access pathways to safety."

Project Officer Sarah Hussein agrees,



it's so important to link with local councils, so that we reach as many people who need help as possible."

Climate Action Merri-bek member Andrea Bunting says,



funding for additional drinking fountains along key shopping strips in Merri-bek is much needed."

She adds that the Community Budget Initiatives program has been a great idea and the \$50,000 funding for more public drinking fountains will help promote sustainability for years to come.

More public toilets: at Bonwick Street in Fawkner, Parker Reserve in Coburg and Snell Grove in Oak Park



We're continuing to invest in road resurfacing and reconstruction, allowing safer routes through Merri-bek for both cars and for active transport



The Voice to Parliament Referendum 2023 – Merri-bek says YES to voice, treaty and truth

Later this year, all eligible Australians will have their say in a referendum about whether to change the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

This Voice would be an independent and permanent advisory body, providing advice to the Australian Parliament and Government on matters that effect the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

When the Australian Government announces Referendum Day, all eligible Australians will be asked to vote yes or no for this change to our Constitution.

In 2021, Council signed a Statement of Commitment to Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung People and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People.

Our signed Statement of Commitment supports the Uluru Statement of The Heart. The Uluru Statement of the Heart is an invitation to the Australian people from First Nations Australians. It asks Australians to walk together to build a better future by establishing a First Nations Voice to Parliament to enshrine in the constitution, and establish a Marakrrata (agreement making) Committee for the purpose of treaty making and truth telling.

We recently improved these community spaces by adding lighting across the car park, planting new shade trees with bike hoop protectors and providing 2 new pedestrian crossings and footpaths. We have also installed speed humps for safety, wheel stops and extended kerb outstands. We also added more pram crossings, new line marking and new signage.



Moomba Park Wetlands, Fawkner

We've recently created a new wetland, including a pond for the threatened Victorian frog species, the Growling Grass Frog, a loop walking track to enjoy, seating areas to relax on and vantage points for wildlife observation.
