Over 3 incursions, CERES School of Nature and Climate will work with your students to design and create a fully planted, wildlife friendly garden at your school.



## **WHAT'S ON OFFER:**

#### School participation in the program includes:

- Activity 1: Site assessment (to assess garden site, no student involvement)
- Activity 2: Teacher Professional Development Workshop (1hr webinar)
- Activity 3: Online student incursion (1hr webinar) to build knowledge
- **Activity 4:** In-person student incursion (X2 45min sessions) to design and plan for planting,
- **Activity 5:** In-person student incursion (X2 45min sessions) to plant garden at school
- **Activity 6:** In-person student excursion (X1 45min session) to participate in a community planting in a local public space.

#### Key requirements and commitment from you:

- Selection of a group of no more than 30 students from grades 3 6 to engage in three incursions
- Commitment to nominating a teacher as the main point of contact who will receive time release as required to attend all teacher and student education sessions
- To provide detailed information including measurements and photos of a proposed garden site (no larger than 49m2)

# **INCURSION CONTENT:**

**Incursion 1:** 

1 x 1hr online session

- Students explore the importance of biodiversity and why wildlife species are disappearing in urban areas to consider ways to protect ecosystems
- Students engage in a habitat survey to determine what habitat is already available for local wildlife at their school



2 x 45 minute sessions in person

- Students explore how wildlife gardens are structured to provide habitat for lots of different wildlife species
- Students are introduced to various indigenous plants that provide habitat for local wildlife species
- Students engage in soil tests to check the soil PH, type and water absorption prior to planting
- Students are supported to create a to scale design of their garden space



2 x 45 minute sessions in person

- Students learn about gardening tools and how to use them safely
- Students plant indigenous seedlings to create the wildlife garden
- Students learn about about the needs of a newly planted garden and make a plan for how to ensure the garden is able to establish and flourish
- Students consider 'future additions' to their garden to continue to increase the biodiversity of their school and improve habitat for wildlife
