

Keeping your cat safe and on your property

Does your pet cat enjoy escaping and roaming the streets? Did you know that cats can roam up to 3km in one night?

Cats escape their homes for many different reasons, but ultimately keeping your cat confined is your responsibility as its owner.

If your cat does often escape and roam it risks the following:

- Being hit by cars and suffering injuries or death
- Being attacked by other roaming animals

- Contracting diseases by ighting or mating with other roaming cats
- Killing wildlife
- Getting lost
- Being picked up by strangers and never returned
- Being picked up by Council and taken to the pound
- If your cat is not desexed our unowned cat population will continue to increase

You might risk being fined

If your cat trespasses onto other people's property or is picked up by Council, you may receive a fine. Fees are payable to reclaim your cat.

Hints to confining your cat

- Different kinds of animal enclosures can be used outdoors to ensure your cat has fresh air and adequate room to move.
- Verandas and side yards can be enclosed for your cat's enjoyment. Open an adjoining window when you are home and your cat will have the best of both worlds.
- Install an incline to the top of the fence to prevent your cat climbing over. You can also use a tube called a "Coyote Roller". This stops your cat from getting a grip on the top of your fence to climb over.








Use animal enclosures
